## The Challenge

The eastern region of DRC has been embroiled in conflict for over 25 years. It is the largest humanitarian disaster since the Second World War: more than 6 million Congolese have been killed, with millions more displaced.


This is partially due to the nation's vast mineral resources. Armed militia groups utilize brutal violence -- including sexual violence -- to gain control over the communities where these lucrative minerals are located.

As the incidence of sexual violence has skyrocketed, access to services has become even more strained -- leaving countless survivors with limited access to care or justice.

Rape is used as a weapon of war to destroy communities and assert dominance.

## STRATEGIC EXPANSION OF HOLISTIC CARE

The ongoing conflict and accompanying high incidence of sexual violence in DRC has resulted in staggering numbers of survivors of sexual violence. Even conservative estimates point to hundreds of thousands of new victims every year. Unfortunately, this epidemic is accompanied by a lack of access to health care in seemingly every corner of the country. According to the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) Service Coverage Index, which measures access to essential services including reproductive, maternal, newborn and child health, infectious diseases, non-communicable diseases and service capacity and access, DRC scores in the lowest 6% of the world.

In response to this epidemic of sexual violence, Panzi Hospital & Foundation have developed a highly successful model of care that is currently deployed at our four Panzi One Stop Centers, but also in dozens of other health structures across the country. The demand for these services is much greater than our ability to meet them, however.




#### WHAT IS A ONE STOP CENTER?

A One Stop Center is an implementation of holistic care which offers all four pillars of holistic healing within a single system, most commonly under one roof or through one entry point.

This model directly addresses the challenge that many survivors of sexual violence face in accessing comprehensive and high-quality care.

OSCs are often integrated into existing health care structures to avoid isolating survivors and reduce the risk of stigmatization.





## STRATEGIC EXPANSION OF HOLISTIC CARE

Human Rights Watch reported that fewer than 50% of rape victims have access to basic medical facilities. According to the Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Sub Cluster in DRC, only a handful of providers offer holistic care, and the number that provide multiple pillars under one roof is even lower.

We are determined to change this, and fill the care gap.



## REFINED UNDERSTANDING **OF IMPACT**

Panzi Hospital & Foundation have worked for over 20 years to fill in the gaps left by decades of conflict and neglect. With over 80,000 survivors treated, it is clear that demand for our services remains high - as sexual violence continues, and lack of access to care persists.

So much of what we do and have done has been triage: the sheer number of survivors and staggering lack of care has left us scrambling to provide access to quality services to as many survivors as possible. It has only been in recent years that we have been able to step back, take a breath, and start to evaluate what we have done, and continue to do, with a more critical lens.

## FURTHER COLLABORATION WITH PARTNERS

Panzi is best known for our Holistic Model of Care. And while most of our programming centers around this, we have also quickly become one of the largest Congolese organizations in the east of the country. For this reason, we have gained the trust of valued partners and funders all around the world – all of whom share the same goal that we do – to provide our survivors and beneficiaries with the tools to transform their communities, and eventually, the Congo at large. As a result, in addition to our holistic care programming, we have also executed, and hope to continue to execute, programs in other domains as well.



#### PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

We have recently begun a project with the to assist survivors and other vulnerable women in the growing, transforming, roasting, and selling of coffee. While we have expertise in-house at Panzi Foundation for the agricultural aspects of coffee production, we do not have experience roasting or selling the final product.

For this reason, we have recently partnered with a coffee company based in Goma. The company has a local roasting facility and even has a coffee shop where baristas expertly craft frothy cappuccinos. Survivors and other vulnerable women will be trained over the next few years to become experts in the roasting process, as well baristas.





#### **FURTHER COLLABORATION** WITH PARTNERS

One of the ways we have been able to do this is through partnering with other Congolese NGOs, companies, and civil society organizations. Partnering with other local institutions allows us to expand our reach, without compromising efficiency or efficacy. Perhaps more importantly, it also enables us to build relationships, trust, and social capital in communities where we work.

We are committed to providing survivors with the quality services that they deserve, but also helping to transform their communities as well, and we cannot do this alone.

Over the next five years, we seek to not only continue collaborating with our existing partners in the DRC, but also to expand our network of partner organizations and companies.

## DEVELOPMENT OF TRANSFORMATIVE PROGRAMMING

A core goal of our holistic model for many years was to reintegrate survivors into their communities with as little stigma as possible. This meant providing them with medical care to heal any wounds and cure any ailments; offer emergency psychological assistance to address the significant trauma they experienced; provide access to legal services to safeguard the search for justice; and finally, to offer trainings and livelihood programs that ensure that survivors can survive, independently, if need be.

This goal is still very much a reality for many of our survivors and program participants. But 20+ years into this work, we are acknowledging that our programming can and should go beyond simple reinsertion, when the survivors wish to do so.



#### **PROJECT SPOTLIGHT**



Sexual violence is strongly linked to the battle for control of mineral wealth in the DRC. Rape, assault, and other forms of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) are used as war tactics to control mines and smuggling routes.

In 2020, Panzi began the Jewelry Project which seeks to transform the lives of survivors and beneficiaries via dignified and highly-skilled employment, but also seeks to transform the society itself by developing economic models in the artisanal and small-scale mining sector that benefit women, instead of harming them.



### DEVELOPMENT OF TRANSFORMATIVE PROGRAMMING

Empowered women empower other women. We believe that survivors can change the world.

For this reason, in recent years we have begun to develop what we call transformative programming. Transformative programming refers to our interventions that not only aim to enhance opportunities for survivors or participants but also strive to bring about significant societal transformation.

We are committed to expanding our transformative programming in the next five years and ensuring that survivors have the opportunity to return to their communities if they so choose, but also to change those communities in the process.

## ACTIVE ADVOCACY FOR POLICY CHANGE
